The Establishment of the Community Mental Health System



- The Community Mental Health Act of 1963 was an act to provide federal funding for community mental health centers and research facilities in the United States.
- This legislation was passed as part of John F. Kennedy's New Frontier.
- The act offered support to construct mental health centers that provided community-based care as an alternative to institutionalization.
- It led to considerable deinstitutionalization.

New Hampshire Community Mental Health Centers

Ten, state designated, non-profits

Two Centers include Developmental Services

24-hour Emergency Services, Assessment ,and Evaluation through Mobile Crisis Teams

Provide a broad, comprehensive array of high quality, effective, and accessible mental health services

Offer evaluations and treatment services across the age span, from birth to end of life

Provide care regardless of ability to pay

Catchment Regions Map



SED:

Diagnosed with an Axis I diagnosis other than substance abuse

Experiences a significant impairment in psychosocial functioning

SED-Interagency:

Current legal relationship with the school district, DCYF, or DJJS
